Healthcare Impact Report

The trend in CCH's healthcare ministry continues to be Growth (with a capital G)! The Jacmel area continues to swell with people who've been driven out by gangs in other areas of Haiti. CCH's vaccination program started in January 2025, with a 64% increase in vaccinations since last year. Patient visits at our Primary Care and PT/OT Rehab Clinics have increased 21% since the same time last year.

The healthcare facilities that are still operating in Haiti are similarly feeling the strain. That's why we share resources and work together as much as possible. CCH clinic staff welcomed and trained 55 interns from local universities in Nursing and PT/OT. We also donated some unused equipment to a partner organization that was struggling to finalize their new women's health surgical suite. And we continue to deepen our relationship with Jacmel nonprofit Sous Lavi, a mental health provider that is now sharing space on the second floor of our building.

CCH also expanded services in 2026 by joining the Ministry of Health (MSPP)'s malnutrition program, which will help us provide outreach for children in our clinic and partner schools.

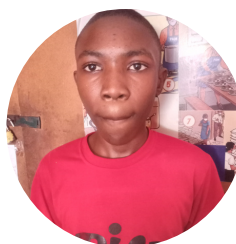

CCH partner schools finished out their academic years with celebrations of success. Amid all of life's uncertainties in Haiti, our teachers, students, and families keep finding joy. And CCH keeps providing food, school supplies, and medicines for our school nurses! The number of students we help feed has increased by 36% from last year to this year.

To keep our commitment to education quality while freeing up more resources for school food, medicines, and supplies, CCH shifted our model of teacher training. Over the past school year, CCH Education Liaison Roosevelt Adonis has been receiving training from US education volunteers on 8 different topics. He then translated those resources into Kreyol and led training sessions with our 11 partner school principals. Roosevelt also makes site visits for classroom observation and one-on-one guidance as needed.

This year, instead of large centralized trainings, our Community Development staff is going into communities for smaller, local training sessions. This change has been well-received and has allowed us to train more community members, not just the leaders, without sacrificing the quality of the training. We were also thrilled to receive a small grant that allowed us to implement more latrine building in the community of Savanne du Bois.

CCH's goat program is still kicking (and bleating), even though we haven't purchased new goats since 2019. As of this year, 46 goats are still providing families with a "piggy bank," and 8 new baby goats were distributed to waiting families, thanks to the legacy of this program.

CCH also hosted a tool and seedling distribution event on May 1st—Agriculture/Labor Day in Haiti. This year, pickaxes, machetes, and hoes were given to farming co-ops, along with citrus seedlings to help farmers grow more citrus instead of importing from the Dominican Republic.
